Final Casualty Figures on War Due in 2 Weeks

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department said Monday it will take two weeks to compile tentative final figures on Korean war casualties, but even these will be subject to change for months.

The latest figures, announced last Wednesday, showed 139,272 American casualties. These included 24,985 dead, 101,368 wounded, 2,938 captured, 8,476 missing, and 1,525 previously reported missing but since returned to military duty.

A department spokesman said one more weekly list will be issued Wednesday, including casualties whose next of kin were notified through last Friday. It will include casualties during the final big Communist offensive but not those during the war's last week.

He said the department later will announce its tentative final figures as soon as possible. It usually takes 10 days to two weeks to notify next of kin.

Changes in the tentative totals could result from the return of men previously reported as missing, deaths traceable to wounds, and other causes. Final figures for World War II were issued only recently.

The Department is expected to continue to issue its daily list of casualties for about two weeks.

House Votes to Kill RFC Lending Agency

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Monday passed a compromise bill to kill the 21-year-old Reconstruction Finance Corp. and create a new agency to handle small business loans.

The measure, which now goes back to the Senate which passed its own version, was opposed by Democrats who pointed to "signs" of an economic recession and predicted the Republicans would "regret" the move within two years.

Anticipating final passage, President Eisenhower asked Congress Monday for \$72,295,000 to begin operation of the new agency. Simultaneously, he withdrew a request for \$3,250,000 for the small defense plants corp.

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3 Veteran German Reds Purged in Party Shakeup

BERLIN (UP)—East German Communist "strongman" Walter Ulbricht tightened his grip on the party Monday by purging three veteran German Reds from the powerful Politburo and Central Committee.

Ulbricht's strength now is greater than ever. The purging of the three men was another round in the deputy premier's struggle for power with premier Otto Grotewohl, Western diplomatic sources said.

The latest victims of the party shakeup which followed the June 17 worker's rebellion against Communist domination were: Franz Dahlem, dropped from the policy making bureau; Wilhelm Zaisser, recently fired secret police head, dropped from the Politburo and Central Committee and Rudolph Herrendstadt, dropped from the Central Committee.

The decisions to oust the men were taken by the Central Committee. The committee also confirmed that Justice Minister Max Fechner had been ousted two weeks from the party as an "enemy of the state."

The ousting of Zaisser was the end of the former security minister's political career.

Dahlem was the former chief of the powerful Central Commission—the watchdog of the party.

Monroney Attacks Aid Reds, McCarthy Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy asserted Monday that Sen. A. S. Mike Monroney's attacks on him are rendering an "evil service" to the Communist party.

Monroney (D-Okla.) has criticized the Wisconsin Republican several times recently, both on and off the Senate floor. He kept the feud going in a television appearance Sunday night by saying the new Republican administration has produced "mountains of legislation and mountains of McCarthy."

McCarthy's answer, read to reporters from a hand-scrawled statement said Monroney "should be earning his salary working for the people of Oklahoma and America instead of taking over the job of whitewashing and covering up Communism and corruption."

He said Monroney had used the Senate floor "for smear and character assassination against members of our staff who cannot in turn use the Senate floor to fight back."

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
