7 More Accused of Hatch Violations

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Civil Service Commission said Tuesday that seven more internal revenue service employees in South Dakota have been accused of violating the Hatch act ban on political activity by federal employees.

In response to inquiries, commission officials said that "letters of charges" have been sent to the seven, telling them they have been accused of soliciting funds illegally for the Democratic party.

The seven, whose names were withheld, have 15 days to answer the charges.

The commission Monday dismissed four supervisory employees of the internal revenue service in South Dakota on similar charges. It also changed the record of one former service employee who resigned voluntarily to show that he had been found guilty of violating the Hatch act.

Visit to POW Camp Banned, Group Says

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—United Nations members of joint Red Cross teams said Tuesday the Communists refused to allow them to visit Prison Camp No. 5 where 2,400 Americans were reported to have died of starvation and illness.

Twenty-seven members of joint Red Cross teams returned here Tuesday after a three-week trip into North Korea to inspect Communist prison camps.

Brig. R. M. Jerram, of Britain, senior member of the UN team, said he suspected that Allied POWs interviewed were well briefed by the Communists beforehand.

He said there was not a single complaint about conditions of treatment from prisoners they interviewed.

Valentino's Flame Visits Idol's Tomb

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Dita Flame, who says she is the original "woman in black," has made another annual visit to the tomb of the late film idol Rudolph Valentino.

Miss Flame appeared at the crypt Monday on the 27th anniversary of the actor's death dressed in black with a sheer black veil covering her face, and placed red roses on the tomb.

A woman in black has visited the great lover's tomb ever since government limited radio broadcasts of domestic weather reports for fear the enemy would hear them, NBC farm commentator Everett Mitchell got special permission to open each "National Farm and Home Hour" with his customary greeting, "It's a beautiful day in Chicago." Government officials decided the message would confuse any eavesdropping enemies since Mitchell's cheery greeting never varied—rain, shine, or howling blizzard.

Evicted Mother of 5 Asks for Housing Aid

A town of Blooming Grove mother of five, who was evicted Friday from her Edwards Park home, appealed Tuesday to the Wisconsin State Journal to help her find housing for her family.

Mrs. Lorraine Crotzenberg, whose husband left her with the five youngsters, said she was living with the George Phillips family in Edwards Park, while her children were staying with other neighbors until housing could be found.

Mrs. Crotzenberg was left with three daughters and two sons, ranging in age from 22 months to 13 years, she said.

Bradley Merges More Voice for Scientists

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Omar N. Bradley advocated Tuesday scientists be given a greater voice in the Pentagon's strategic military planning.

The 60-year-old retired soldier said the nation's protection lies in the wise application of America's scientific and technical superiority over Soviet Russia.

He added that the rapid development of new atomic weapons and guided missiles already had shaken old concepts of strategy and ideas on the division of responsibilities between the three services.

The former chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff gave his views in an article written for the current issue of the Saturday Evening Post.
