A broadcast of the opening of this country's most outstanding summer music festival will be heard tonight when the Boston Symphony orchestra inaugurates its fifth annual Berkshire festival over station WLS at 6:30.

From Toronto, Canada, the Toronto Promenade Symphony orchestra will present another weekly concert with Dr. Frank Simon, director of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, as guest conductor, and Alberto Guerrero, pianist, as soloist. Station WIBA is the outlet at 7 p. m.

The Windy city's Grant Park concert tonight is headed by John Carter, tenor, and Jerzy Bojanoski's orchestra. The concert will be broadcasted through several stations, starting at 7:30 p. m. over WMAQ.

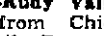
6 p. m. — Men Against Death (WHAS): another in a series re-enacting the fight of Louis Pasteur in the field of hydrophobia.

8:30 p. m.—Robert L. Johnson (WBBM): the former Pennsylvania relief administrator speaks on "Taking Politics Out of Relief."



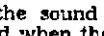

7 p. m.—Major Bowes (WBBM): the amateur hour search for talent continues.

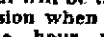
