

Glenda Farrell Scheduled As Guest On Bob Hope Show

Mayor Of North Hollywood Has A Chance To Learn What Constituents Think Of Her Administration

Glenda Farrell, screen actress and Mayor of North Hollywood, will make a guest appearance on the show starring Bob Hope, Tuesday at 10:00 p. m. over WEAF.

Miss Farrell's visit will give her a chance to learn what her constituents think as Hope is a resident of North Hollywood and Jerry Colonna, the mad professor, also has his home in Miss Farrell's bailiwick.

Patricia Wilder (Honeychile) and Skinnay Ennis will uphold the honor of the South against the attacks of three Californians. In addition to a heckling match between the Mayor and her citizens, Hope's half hour program will feature a song sketch, with Colonna, Bill Goodwin, Skinnay Ennis and the Six Hits and a Miss. Ennis' orchestra will provide the musical background and Skinnay's baritone will be heard in vocal selections.

Despite their move to the sunnier clime of California, Fibber McGee and company will invoke the prerogatives of radio and continue to pursue their eventful lives in Wistful Vista during their broadcast over WEAF Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. Abetted by Horatio K. Boomer, The Old Times, Nick De-Popolus, Mrs. Uppington, Hal Pearl and other Wistful Vista citizenry, Fibber will get into as much hot water as usual. Donald Novis will sing, "Only A Rose," the Four Notes will swing "Sing For Your Supper," and Billy Mills' orchestra will hail musically "Great Day" and "Zing Went the Strings of My Heart."

Jack Teagarden, one of the noblest Romans of swing, joins Benny Goodman's band for the Swing Session of Tuesday at 9:30 p. m. on WABC. Mr. Jackson T., as Teagarden is known among the hot musicians, will ride to glory on "Basin Street Blues," a vehicle he made famous with his trombone. Mr. Jackson T. is a recent graduate from the Paul Whiteman band. His appearance on the Goodman broadcast is a commencement day exercise. Next week he begins a career as an orchestra leader. Teagarden's tromboning is said to be of such tremendous power that it takes two men to hold his instrument for him. He has been known to blow excruciating top notes thru his fingers when the trombone couldn't take it any more. Johnny Mercer, song-writing, scat-singing master of ceremonies, will join Teagarden in "Dr. Heckle and Mr. Jive." "Fialien in Swing," written by Ziggy Elman, the Goodman cornetist, will be presented in a new version, with zingy-chanteuse Martha Tilton doing the vocal. The top of the program will blow off with "Begin the Benuigne," a number Goodman has repeatedly refused to do until he found the perfect arrangement. He believes he has it now.

Johnny Green and his orchestra will take over the musical assignments on the Johnny Presents program, succeeding Russ Morgan's orchestra, beginning Tuesday, at 8 p. m., over WEAF. Green, composer, pianist and band leader, is a veteran in radio, and has been featured with many NBC headlines including the Jack Benny and Packard programs. Among his well known song hits are "Out of Nowhere," "Body and Soul,"
