

Classical, Popular Numbers To Be Offered By Soprano

Lucille Manners Plans To Mix Up Presentations;
Labor Leader To Be Heard At 9:30
P. M. Friday

Lecuona's "Siboney" and Grieg's "I Love Thee" will be Lucille Manner's featured soprano solos on the concert conducted by Dr. Frank Black over WEAf Friday, from 7 to 8 p. m.

Miss Manners also will sing Porter's "Night and Day," and will be heard with Ross Graham, baritone, in Kern's "I Am So Eager." "I Want What I Want" from Herbert's "Mlle. Modiste" will be Graham's solo, and the ensemble will offer Rodger's "This Can't Be Love," Kern's "There's A Hill Beyond a Hill" and Hollander's "Strange Enchantment."

Orchestral highlights will include Chopin's "Polonaise Militaire," Nevin's "Mighty Lak' a Rose," the March from Wagner's "Tannhauser," and "Oxford Street" from Eric Coates's "London Again" suite. The dramatic portion will feature another in the "Romance of Oil" episodes.

Problems relating to this country's economic and industrial future will be analyzed by Daniel Tobin, president of the Truck Drivers union of the AFL, during the "America Unlimited" program from 9:30 to 9:45 p. m. over WEAf. Tobin will be interviewed by an official of the U. S. Department of Labor. He will forecast probable results of recent legislation affecting labor and industry.

Two currently popular melodies, "My Heart Has Wings" by Schaeffer, and "I'll Remember" by Lane, will be sung by Frank Munn, tenor, during the Waltz Time program, with Abe Lyman and his orchestra and the chorus, from 8 to 8:30 p. m. over WEAf. Lyman and the orchestra will offer "Masquerade," "Dolores," "Santa Lucia," and "Cherie." "Little Rose of the Rancho" and "Let Me Call You Mine," by the orchestra and chorus, will round out the program.
