Ever since she was a little girl, Sylvia Rhodes wanted to be in radio. After leaving high school, in Pittsburgh, she took up vocal work, and in 1935 joined Ace Brigode's orchestra. There followed a nation wide tour with the band, Sylvia auditioned at WLW early in 1939, and in a swift rise to stardom won the singing spot on Marathon Melodies, fed by WLW to NBC Fridays at 8:30 p. m.
