## \$15,000 ACTION FILED IN MAN'S DEATH BY BULL

WAPAKONETA, March 17 — The death of Jesse Hatfield of near Waynesfield, who died two years ago from injuries received when gored by a bull, today was the basis of a \$15,000 money suit filed in Auglaize-co common pleas court against Harold Atchinson and Peter Blosser, a Hardin-co partnership engaged in farming and livestock raising.

The plaintiff's petition, filed by William Hatfield as administrator of the Jesse Hatfield estate, charged that the partners did not warn the deceased that the animal was vicious, altho aware of the fact at the time.

Hatfield was injured March 14, 1939, as he was leading the animal from a barn to a watering trough. The bull, according to the petition, knocked the deceased down and then gored him, inflicting fatal injuries before help arrived. Jesse Hatfield was in the employ of the defendants at the time of the accident.

Local court attaches said that the case was the first of its kind ever filed in the history of Auglaize-co common pleas court, altho money cases are predominant among those filed each year, in so far that death was attributed to an animal.
