STRICTER SUGAR RATION RULES SEEM PROBABLE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21—(UP).—Stricter sugar rationing regulations appeared imminent today, following on the heels of the war production board's disclosure of tentative rationing plans for industrial sugar.

Cuts up to 40 per cent in some industrial uses and restriction of individual consumption to 12 ounces a week may undergo further alteration as a result of unexpected war shipping problems and consequent uncertainty of normal importations from Cuba and other sources.

No mention was made of the possible cuts in industrial rationing plans, but it was indicated
