

Story Of Revere's Ride To Be Told On Monday Program

Noted Actor Raymond Massey Will Enact Leading Role; Naval Oath Will Have Place Of Honor On Night Show

How one Lige Butterwick's aching tooth sent Paul Revere on his historic ride will be the "Cavalcade of America" production for Monday at 8 p. m. over WEAF. Raymond Massey, getting relief from the role of Abraham Lincoln for a spell, will be starred as the wretched Lige.

Lige Butterwick, a New England farmer, takes his aching molar to Barber Joe at Lexington, but Barber Joe's diagnosis is that it's too big a job for him. He recommends that Lige see the Boston coppersmith, Paul Revere, and have a large substitute tooth made for the huge gap-to-be.
