

Garry Moore To Launch Own Program Wednesday Evening

Program Set From Chicago At 10 P. M. Via Blue Network; Nick And Nora Charles Find More Adventures

Garry Moore, the diminutive purveyor of hilarious nonsense, will launch his own show over the Blue Network, beginning Wednesday. A variety program of music and monkeyshines, the broadcast will be heard each week from 10 to 10:30 p. m. Entitled the Garry Moore Show, the program will originate in Chicago.

Garry, long known to afternoon dialers as the M. C. of Club Matinee's Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday sessions, will be supported in his new venture by a large company. Topping the cast will be Hugh Studebaker, creator of "Silly Watson." Danny Thomas, popular young M. C. with Chicago night club habitués, and Donelda Curry, versatile comedienne.

Imperturbable Nick Charles and his glamorous wife, Nora, always up to date, are picked up by a U. S. government official after their boat is blown from under them in the Caribbean during "The Thin Man" drama Wednesday, at 8 p. m.

It's toss and roll for awhile with Nora going off on her own as a cafe singer in a Central American port town and Nick figuring out ways and means to trap the spy ring operating in surrounding waters. With both their lives in jeopardy the Charleses encounter more than enough excitement for one evening as, against a background of South American music and tropical night life, they come thru for Uncle Sam and point up current newspaper headlines.
