CHICAGO-(U.P)-Like the hoot of a wise old owl, "Who's Who" has echoed from library shelves for years. Now a new tune has been added—"Who Was Who."

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Officials of A. N. Marquis Chicago, have announced Co., publication of a new refer-ence book, "Who Was Who," ence book, "Who Was Who," containing biographies of dead persons listed in "Who's Who" from its founding in 1897 to 1942.

The increase in volumes de-voted to the war, officials ex-plained, has placed a premi-um on library space. They said cost experts estimate the expense of maintaining one expense of maintaining one foot of shelving in a public library at between \$1 and \$2 a year.
