NEWSPRINT CUT ORDERED BY WPB

Five Per Cent Reduction In Third Quarter To Hit Publishers

WASHINGTON, July 7—(AP)
—The War Production Board today ordered newspaper publishers
to reduce further their consumption of newsprint during 1943's
third quarter. The cut ranges up
five per cent for large users.

The additional five per cent reduction does not apply to the first 25 tons for newspapers using less than 500 tons a quarter. This provision, WPB said, is designed to aid the operation of smaller news
