"Five Graves to Cairo," the powerful story of the Allies' victorious drive against Rommel in Africa, will be presented Monday at 8 p. m. EST over WABC. Producer Cecil B. DeMille will star Franchot Tone and Anne Baxter in their original screen roles.

## SIX ESCAPE AS ARMY TRAINING PLANES CRASH

ALLIANCE, O., Dec. 12—(AP) --Five of six co-pilots of three Army training planes on a routine flight out of George Field, Lawrenceville, Ill., received minor injuries last night when their ships made crash landings in North-eastern Ohio and Western Pennsylvania.

The planes, all twin-engine advanced trainers, apparently became separated from their flight of six during a snow storm. One crashed near West Middlesex, Pa., another landed a half-mile east of the Alliance, O., airport while the third crashed five miles north of Ashland, O. The remaining three planes proceeded safely to their destination.

Harold Blinn, Jr., and Ingrah Blaxon were taken to Alliance city hospital but their condition was not reported serious. Occupants of the plane which fell near Ashland were identified as John J. Borch and Harold Chamberlain. Both cadets parachuted from the ship and one was reported to have received a sprained ankle.
