

By FLORENCE HARSHE (Limn Public Library Staff) MY THREE YEARS WITH EISENHOWER is an entertaining backstage account of some of the most important leaders and events in World War II. The book comprises the day-to-day diary of Capt. Harry C. Butcher who was assigned as naval aide to Dwight Eisenhower from Gen. 1942 to 1945. Cap. Butcher has sketched a friendly portrait of Eisenhower as a man and as a military leader. There are also revealing glimpses of other Allied Montgomery, commanders — of Tedder, Patton, and others. The chronicle is highly personal and most informal and has been illuswith some fine phototrated graphs.

The courage and faith of another great military leader are revealed in Gen. Jonathan Wainwright's account of his four years GENERAL WAINof defeat. STORY, edited by WRIGHT'S Robert Considine, tells of the fighting on Bataan and Corregidor, of surrender to the Japanese, of grueling months of captivity and of final rescue. His is a heroic, yet grim, story told simply and directly. (It has been published in the Lima News.)
