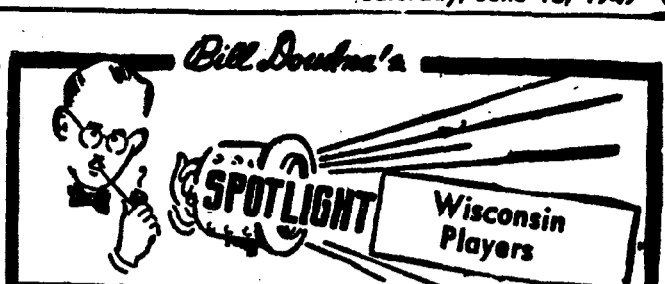

Three thousand season tickets for Wisconsin Players' summer playbill will go on sale Monday at the Wisconsin Union theater box-office, and in campus booths. Purchasers will be able to exchange coupons for reserved seat tickets beginning Thursday.

The series will include Maude Scheerer's sixth appearance. This time she will present a reading of Maxwell Anderson's "Anne of the Thousand Days". Dates are Aug. 4, 5, and 6.

The season will open July 7, 8, and 9 with "An Inspector Calls." The second play will be "Antigone," on July 21, 22, and 23, and the schedule will close with "The Philadelphia Story" on Aug. 11, 12, and 13.

Prof. John E. Dietrich, associate director of the Players, emphasized that season books can be bought by Madison residents as well as campus folk.

Indian Wife Beater

Sentenced to Prison

Vernon White, Lac du Flambeau Indian, and William L. Fuller, 22, Menomonie, were sentenced to two years each in prison, Friday by Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone.

White, who has a record as a "bad actor," according to Asst. U. S. Atty. Carl Runge, was sentenced for assaulting his wife with a clubbed rifle.

Fuller was brought into court on a charge of stealing a \$40 check from the mails at a Menomonie restaurant where he has been employed as a cook since he was granted probation by an Arkansas federal judge last February for transporting a stolen car.

Al Smoliah, Chicago, was scheduled to appear for revocation of his probation as the alleged leader of a sugar ration stamp counterfeiting conspiracy, but Stone was informed federal officers have been unable to find him. Smoliah was sentenced by Stone Oct. 31, 1947 to a year's imprisonment and a \$1,500 fine, but the sentence was suspended for 2 years' probation.
