Double Social Security Number Can Cause Loss

Persons with more than one social security number stand a chance of losing some of the benefits due them, according to Sydney S. Miller, manager of the Madison social security office.

Only wages credited to an employe's social security number can be used to determine the amount of benefits payable when he files a claim, Miller said.

Unless the applicant can furnish a record of all social security numbers he has used, he continued, the applicant or his family may not get credit for all the wages he earned in jobs covered by social security.

It is important, Miller said, that every employe get credit under one number for everything he has earned in a job covered by social security.

He urged persons with more than one number to contact his office at 414 E. Washington ave. Anyone who loses his card should get a duplicate at the office, he said, rather than applying for a new card with a new number.
