"Unfortunately, the release conlinued, this practice frequently is allowed to persist unchecked from childhood through into adult life Children often imitate adult 'nal-biters,' with whom they are thrown in contact. In fact, nail-biting is commonest among children who have been accustomed to witness it in one or both parents or in other adults with whom they are associated.
